I have sent my son Richard Bagot with his my Son your honest neighbor Mr Sheldon which I pray. praying God to bless him and Continue him in and with all yours in in health and send them and us his gracious protection. And so requiring my love service may be remembered ever assured unto you and your worthy Lady with like from my wife will ever rest
