Who we find to be a poor weak Sick and impotent Creator. no way able to labor, thereby to relieve him Self and much fitter it is that he were Comforted Then Chastised. I Thought good therefore to Commend his miserable and lamentable estate to your Worship's wisdom and Compassion: that if you Shall So please he may be discharged And Set at liberty. Thus humbly Taking my Leave and Rest. your Worship's to be Command
